





Chart 1: Budget (revenue v expenditure)



The Budget is in deficit so borrowing is required to fund expenditure.








The deficit in 2020 is larger than expected in the Budget last year.

Chart 10: Major changes to revenue in 2020






Chart 2: Revenue and spending over time




Revenue and expenditure are expected to fall between 2020 and 2024.

Debt is expected to peak in 2021 before falling to current levels by 2024.




Chart 6: Growth: Economy and inflation


Chart 9: Infrastructure expenditure




This represents capital expenditure directly funded by the Government only.
